Whether I'm painting birds, cocktails, fruits or flowers, the best part of the process for me is when all the little details come together at the end.

I've always enjoyed creating, whether it be through needlework, crafts or cooking, but having discovered the pleasure of painting at this stage of the game is a gift, indeed!"

BEAUFORT Remembers

We're Underway!

Have you heard the buzz? If not, you're hearing it here, now. A new historical documentary is officially underway. The film, *Beaufort Remembers*, will preserve the personal memories of life in early Beaufort in the words, voices and photos of many of our town's long-time residents.

Inspired by the aging and, sadly, the passing of several of Beaufort's oldest citizens, four local women pooled their skill sets to undertake the production of *Beaufort Remembers*, under the auspices of the BHA. The goal is to preserve the legacy of the day-to-day history of growing up in early 20th century Beaufort with personal remembrances and anecdotes not available in factual history or text books.

The film, which will be available on DVD after its premiere, will provide a unique gift for the town we all love. The specific goals are:

• to educate the public on the rhythms of daily life in the early 20th century in an historic coastal village of North Carolina

• to become a resource in the regional history curriculum for teachers and schools

• to involve, honor, recognize and thank our elder citizens for

their sustaining contributions and memories

- to promote community spirit and pride
- to create a living, archival legacy for the town of Beaufort
- to enhance Beaufort tourism and create indirect economic impact

The film will make liberal use of personal photo records and local history experts, in addition to the senior interviews.

The filmmaker, Mark Albertin, of Scrapbook Video Productions in Augusta, GA, has extensive experience in creating award-winning documentaries. Several oral histories in the Remembers series, originated by Mr. Albertin, have aired on public television in their respective cities and towns. We're hoping the same for *Beaufort Remembers!*

Publick Day

On Saturday, April 13 from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm, The Beaufort Historic Site will kick off the spring season with the annual Publick Day event on the grounds at 130 Turner Street. The Site will transform into an open-air marketplace, welcoming visitors to explore the vast array of goods and items for sale from various vendors.

"Publick Times" dates back to the Colonial period and is fashioned after Williamsburg of the 1700s when the General Court was in session. Publick Day gave visitors an opportunity to come to town to see and be seen, conduct court business, shop, gossip, dine and dance. Guests who attend Publick Day can expect to find a variety of vendors selling antiques, vintage finds, collectibles, crafts and more.

Vendor space is available. Applications are being accepted to rent a 10' x 10' space for \$35 if you are a BHA member and \$50 for non-members. Space is first-come, first served, and the event is held rain or shine. Spaces are non-refundable. Vendors must supply their own tables and tent if needed.




IT'S A TOWN TAKEOVER


Over more than 200 years, the Josiah Bell House has been frequently remodeled leaving a jumble of possible decorative styles. Believed to be built about 1795, the house is now interpreted as an evolving family home of over 200 years. And evolved it has.

In the early 1990s the two parlors were decorated to the 1850-1870 Victorian period. Then, going into the dining room things get complicated. In about 1830 the first half of the room was added. Almost 100 years later, the second half of the room was added and is defined by the center arch. So, should it be decorated in the earlier period or in the early 20th century style?

After studying the deeds and the families living there, it was discovered that the house had been a 1921 gift from a mother to her daughter, Lela Thomas, who lived out in the country on Highway 70. Her husband Charles traveled for his highway job causing Lela to be lonely so far out of town. This was an opportunity to be in Beaufort, so they moved and "modernized" windows, baseboards and moldings.

Judy Thomas Brake and her brother Ralph are grand children of the Thomas's. Growing up Judy spent a lot of time with her grandfather in this house. A family member still enjoys the 1920's dining furniture, used for 37 years in what is now the Josiah Bell House until Charles's death in 1958. He and Lela, who died in 1941, had enlarged the dining room and added a modern kitchen to accommodate their family of

The furnishings committee has purchased a dining table and chairs which are Tudor Revival, popular in the 1920s. So the search began for more items, including china, silver





and accessories to compliment the Tudor style and their life style. To be authentic, the room called for every element to be considered, including the chandelier, bulbs and globes, paint colors, window treatments, even the prints and other items that may have been in the home.

Currently the room is in the process of being painted and minor repairs to the wainscot and mouldings are taking place. It will be a surprising and unexpected look for the old house. The (new to us) Tudor dining table and chairs are in place, so that leaves us with the Victorian table (with 4 leaves) and 8 beautifully needle-pointed chairs to be sold or donated. The chairs are so special, because the cushions were done by hand by 8 separate women who loved the Josiah Bell House. We have their initials, but we aren't sure of all the names. The initials are ACC (maybe Ann Costlow), EDS (maybe Evelyn Chadwick), ETC (maybe Elizabeth Cheek), ALW (maybe Alice Wheatly), and then AAV and ALW that we aren't sure of at all. We'd love for the gorgeous walnut table and 6 chairs to go to a loving home. And with things being changed, we are in need of items from the 1920s for the china cabinet and sideboard in the dining room if anyone has items they'd be willing to donate.
